

PARTNER READING CHOICE BOARD

Use this partner reading choice board for daily accountability tasks.




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
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Partner Reading Choice Board

After reading with your partner for the day, choose a task to complete.

Write a 2-3-sentence summary of what you read.

Illustrate a scene or main idea from your reading. Write 2-3 sentences to accompany the illustration.

Create three questions that could be answered using the text. Answer the questions using complete sentences and text evidence.

Make a prediction about what you think will happen next or what you think you will learn next. Back up your prediction with at least one piece of textual evidence.

Choose 3-5 unknown or interesting words from what you read. Use context clues to determine the meanings. Then use the words in unique sentences.

Imagine that you have the chance to interview the author or one of the characters. Make a list of 6-8 questions you would ask.

<u>Fiction</u>

Choose a scene to write from another character's point of view.

Fiction

Choose a scene, and turn it into an illustrated graphic novel or comic. Make sure to include thought and dialogue bubbles.

Fiction

Choose a character from your reading to compare and contrast to you and your partner. Write your comparisons and contrasts in a paragraph or in a Venn diagram.

Nonfiction

In your own words, write about the most interesting facts (choose at least two) that you learned about the topic. What made those facts interesting to you?

Nonfiction

Make a list of 6-8 questions that you still have about the topic.

Nonfiction

Sketch or describe three graphics or illustrations that could be used to accompany the text.
Write about how those graphics support the text.
