# Discussions and Communication in Google Classroom

Google Classroom has some great ways for students and teachers to communicate with each other.

First, make sure your settings allow for students to comment on posts. Click the settings icon on the top right corner in Google Classroom.



Scroll down to "General" settings and make sure you have selected that students can comment. (You will need to do this for each class you teach.)

Click the 3 lines at the top left.



### You can turn notifications on and off based on what emails you want to receive.




### **Option I: Class Discussions**


Go to the "Stream" tab of your Google Classroom.

### Click "Share something with your class."



Type your message to your class. It is automatically set so that it goes to all students in the class you are working in. Click "Post" when you are ready for students to see it!




Click "Add" to include a file or image in your post for your students!

## Students can add a class comment and contribute to group discussion by commenting on the post that you have shared.



You'll receive an email each time a student comments on a thread publicly or privately so you can monitor class discussion.


Reply to that student directly or add a class comment as the teacher!



If a student is responding inappropriately, you can delete the comment and "mute" the student in Google Classroom. Just click the 3 vertical dots and choose which action you want to take.

### **Option 2: Small Group Discussions**


When you go to your "Stream" and share a post, click the "All Students" dropdown and click which students you want to be included in the discussion.




Only the students you check will be able to see and respond to the post. Great for smaller groups of discussions. You can still monitor conversations, and it allows for students to feel more heard.

### **Option 3: One-on-one discussion**

You can use the previous option to click on one individual student to have a discussion with them.




Or, on any assignment that has been posted, students can post a private comment. Teachers can also use the private comment to post feedback on an assignment.





### **Option 4: Post a Question**

### Go to your "Classwork" tab in Google Classroom.



Type the question or discussion topic, and choose whether it is short answer or multiple choice. Add instructions about requirements, and even add a file or image!





Students can edit answer

Allow students to reply to each other or edit their original answer.


You can also select specific students when assigning questions in Google Classroom by clicking the dropdown that says "All Students" and just checking the ones you want to receive it


### **Option 5: Google Docs or Google Slides**


If you assign a student or a group of students work on a Google Doc or Google Slide, you can communicate using the comment section.



Hover on the right side of the document and click the plus sign. Add comments, and even tag students by using the @ symbol before their email address.

Also make a comment by clicking the speech bubble at the top. You can access all comments here as well.





As the teacher, you can put yourself in editing, suggesting, or viewing mode.
