


GOOGLE SLIDES ACCESS

- 1. Make sure you're logged in under the Google Account that you want to use the file with, which is most likely your school account.
- 2. Click on the links below to access the files. The webpage will ask you to **make a copy**. By default, Google Drive will save your copy in your main drive, not a folder.

- 3. I recommend you make a master copy of the file and organize it in a folder so that you have it to access later on. This is helpful if you plan to only assign a few pages at a time to students in Google Classroom.
- 4. Each page contains text boxes for students to type their answers into.
- 5. To assign students pages from the Google Slides file, make a copy of your master. (You can do this by right-clicking on the file, or while the file is open, going to FILE > MAKE A COPY.)
- 6. Rename your new copy. Delete any pages you don't want to assign. I recommend renaming the copy with the standards you want to assign. For example: Exit Slip: Inferences
- 7. If you're using the file with Google Classroom, make sure you make a
 COpy for each student. Otherwise, all of your students will be editing the same copy.
