

3rd Strade READING CENTER



ABOUT THIS RESOURCE

This FREE reading game is from my 3rd grade reading centers (which includes this game and NINE other games). Click here or on the image to purchase the full set to get nine more games.



The center contains one fiction text and two different game boards with text-dependent questions.

The questions on the game board are differentiated into two versions:

- Version 1: This version asks literal questions that are right in the text with very little inferring. It is great for practicing RL.3.1.
- Version 2: This version asks more advanced questions and questions that review multiple standards.

Here are a few options for using the two game boards:

- 1. You can use version 1 with your lower readers and version 2 with your higher readers.
- 2. Use one reading text for two weeks. Use version 1 the first week and then version 2 the next week.
- 3. Use version 1 at the beginning of the year and then version 2 at the end of the year.

OPTIONS FOR USE

Option 1: Print the passage, and give to the students at the beginning of the week. Have the students read the passage prior to going to the center. Then when they come to the center, they are ready to play the "game" and answer the questions. The passage could even be read as a whole class or sent home for homework.

Option 2: This option works well if the students will have a chance to go to the center 2-3 times a week. The first day, the students will read the passage and discuss. Then on the 2^{nd} or 3^{rd} day, the students will "play" the game.

OPTIONS FOR PLAYING

<u>Option 1:</u> Have the students take turns rolling and moving that many places. Have the student who rolled answer the question, while the other student listens and adds to the answer before checking the answer.

<u>Option 2:</u> Have the students take turns rolling and moving that many places. However, have both students answer the question in a written format before discussing.

<u>Option 3:</u> Have both students roll and move that many places. Then, both students write the answers to their questions at the same time before discussing with each other.

OPTIONS FOR ASSESSMENT


Option 1: Have the students record the answers to the questions they answer.

Option 2: Use the included exit slips on page 5-7. The students could complete the exit slip after playing the game and turn that in for a grade.

Option 3: Put stars beside questions on the game board that you want the students to record their answers to and turn in for a grade.

Note: I have included a cube to use for a die if you wish for the students to move more slowly across the board.

What happened to the family's car?



Question	Example Answer





ANSWER KEY: FICTION READING CENTER #1

Question	Example Answer
What is the meaning of the word "nestled" from the story?	Snuggled, settled in with, cuddled
Describe the tow truck driver.	The tow truck driver is a kind and helpful man.
What is the problem in the story? How is it solved?	The problem is that the family's car breaks down on the way to a camping trip. The problem is solved when the tow truck driver suggests a new camping location.
What is the meaning of the word "elated" from the story?	Happy, thrilled, overjoyed
How does Chirag view fishing and camping? How does that compare with your point of view?	Chirag views fishing as an enjoyable and fun hobby. Students' views will vary.
How did the family know something was wrong with the car?	The car began to shake, and smoke was coming from it.
Where were Chirag and his family headed to at the beginning of the story?	Chirag and his family were headed to a start park to fish and camp.
What lesson did Chirag learn?	Chirag learned that sometimes things can take a different turn, but you can still have a good time.
What does "smiling ear to ear" mean?	It means to smile really big or smile a lot.
When Chirag is begging his parents, he says that they already have their stuff. What stuff does he mean?	Sleeping bags, tents, fishing poles, and other supplies

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
