Eat Lucky Foods

All around the world, people believe that eating certain foods on New Year's Day will bring them a year of good luck. People in Greece and Eastern Europe enjoy vasilopita. Vasilopita is a special type of bread or cake. It contains a hidden trinket. Whoever receives the trinket will have good luck all year long.

In Italy, they feast on a new year's dish of pork sausage over lentils. The sausage represents abundance. The lentils symbolize money. Eating both on New Year's Day promises a great year and is believed to pack a double punch of good fortune.

In the United States, there is a long list of foods that are considered lucky, especially in the South. Cornbread, black-eyed peas, collard greens, smoked sausage, and cabbage are the most popular. The Pennsylvania Dutch believe that eating sauerkraut on New Year's Day will lead to riches.

Some believe that if you spend New Year's Day with friends and family, happy and content, your year will be just as joyful. If you start the new year crying, you will experience much sadness throughout the upcoming year.
