
# TYPES OF POETRY Mini booket

A haiku poem is a poem with three lines and a total of seventeen syllables. The first line has five syllables, the middle line has seven syllables, and the last line has five syllables.

#### Haiku Poem Example:

The first day of school,

All the kids are excited.

Bell rings! Time to start!

A **cinquain poem** is a poem with five lines and eleven total words.

Cinquain Poem Example:

School

Academic, Elementary

Learning, Teaching, Growing

Young minds molded daily

Education

A **limerick poem** is a poem with five lines and an AABBA rhyme scheme.

#### Limerick Poem Example:

There was a new kid in the class.

His emotions were clear like glass.

He laughed with his eyes,

and handed out fruit pies,

and automatically got an all-access hall pass.

Cinquain Poem



A **diamante poem** is a poem with seven lines that form a diamond shape. The first and last lines are the shortest.

#### Diamante Poem Example:

Eager, Young

Learning, Interacting, Teaching

Classroom is a home away from home

Tiring, Irritating, Uninteresting

Unengaging, Uninspiring

Kitchen

An **acrostic poem** is a poem where the first letter of each line spells out a word or phrase.

#### Acrostic Poem Example:

Starting out a new year of school,

Taking time away from summer and the pool.

Understanding that it's time for the start of the year,

Determined to have the first day without any fear.

Everyone is on the same level on day one,

No one has to worry about spoiling anyone's fun.

The time has come for summer to be done!

A **list poem** is a poem that contains a list or several lists.

#### List Poem Example:

The halls are full of excitement, My nerves are doing a dance of joy. I see classmates, friends,

teachers,

all walking to and from.

I can't wait until recess

to swing on the swings,


slide, laugh,
