A **cinquain poem** is a poem with five lines and eleven total words.

Cinquain Poem Example:

A **limerick poem** is a poem with five lines and an AABBA rhyme scheme.

Limerick Poem Example:

A **diamante poem** is a poem with seven lines that form a diamond shape. The first and last lines are the shortest.

An **acrostic poem** is a poem where the first letter of each line spells out a word or phrase.

Acrostic Poem Example:

No one has to worry about spoiling anyone's fun.

The time has come for summer to be done!

A **list poem** is a poem that contains a list or several lists.

List Poem Example:

The day is almost over.
I can't wait for tomorrow.
I love school.

A **narrative poem** is a poem that tells a story to the reader or audience.

Narrative Poem Example:

A new school day has begun,
time to learn and have some fun.
Math, science, and history, too,
a lifetime of learning waits for you.

Start your day with a smile so bright.
Spread those wings; prepare to take flight.
You're growing up so very fast.
Enjoy this time, as it won't last.

The days of school will soon be done.

A **free verse poem** is a poem
that does not follow rules
and has no rhyme or rhythm
