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


Labor Day began as a day to celebrate the hardworking people of America and all that they do. Now it's a federal holiday, but it took a little while to catch on. The first Labor Day was celebrated in 1882 in New York City. The event was organized by the city's labor unions to celebrate the contributions of the city's workers. It wasn't yet a holiday. Soon after this first celebration, some states began to make it one. The first one was Oregon in 1887. More states followed soon after. However, it would take tragic events in 1894 to make it a national holiday.

The events in question surrounded a strike in Chicago. Railroad workers were unhappy with their treatment, so they stopped working. This crippled travel in and through Chicago. Army troops were sent in to settle the situation and force the strikers back to work. Things went very badly. Violence erupted, and some of the strikers were killed. After these tragic events, President Grover Cleveland wanted to do something to rebuild trust between the government and labor unions. In 1894, he made Labor Day a federal holiday.

What is the connection between Labor Day and school?

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
Labor Day is the first Monday in September. Each new school year usually starts around Labor Day.

That trust had been badly shaken when violence broke out between the army and railroad workers during an 1894 strike.
