## Greek Combining Forms

Note: The levels on the affixes list do not correspond with the levels on the roots list. Level 1 for affixes is $\mathrm{K}-2$, but level 1 for root is 3-5.

## Greek Combining Forms

Greek combining forms can function as prefixes (micro-), bound roots (scope) or suffixes (-ology). Greek combining forms typically hold more specific or technical meanings than typical affixes.

Depending on your students and your preferences, you can teach them separately as Greek combining forms or teach them with the morphemes they typically function as (prefix or suffix).

In this scope and sequence, combining forms are included in the affixes list as well as the roots list. These combining forms from the root list can also function as affixes: auto, bio, geo, photo, tele, kilo, syn, arch, dyna, dys, mono, poly.
